Please do not use cell phones and other electronic devices.

The ringing of the *meditation bowl* calls us to silence, centering and reflection as we prepare for worship.

As you pass the *baptismal font* upon entering or leaving the church, and/or on the way to communion, you may *dip your hand in the water* and *make the sign of the cross*. This is an ancient body prayer to remember you are a baptized child of God. Simply touch your forehead to chest, then your left to right shoulder.

GATHERING

Turn to face the cross as it enters; you may bow as the cross passes, honoring the mystery of our salvation.

Our liturgy is multi-sensory and shows the significance of our bodies and all of God's creation. Used in many religions, the sweet smell of **incense** represents the rising of our prayers and the aroma of Christ spreading in procession throughout the world. We honor (cense) the primary symbols of the liturgy: the people, font, ambo (lectern), book of scriptures, cross, and table (altar).



This Sunday begins a semicontinuous reading of 1 Corinthians. During the weeks after Epiphany, 1 Corinthians is read over the three years: chapters 1–4 in A, 6–9 in B, and 12–15 in C. In chapter 12 Paul presents the beginnings of Christian proclamation concerning the Holy Spirit, the divine spirit who now inhabits the body of Christ. At the beginning of a new calendar year, it is good to hear this list of the gifts that together build up the body of the church.

Christ establishes a new world order, symbolized by the details of this story: his attendance at a wedding, his messianic distance from his natural mother, his providing what the couple needs, the astonishing abundance of Christ's gifts, and the steward's words about "the good wine." Christ's "hour" is coming on the cross. The story concludes with reference to the disciples' belief in Christ. Later, in John 15, Christ himself is the vine.






Preface

Communion

All are welcome at Christ's table, including children. Bread is received in the hands. Wine is received either by drinking from the (silver) common cup, or by saving the bread and dipping it in the second (glass) cup. Gluten-free wafers are available from the presiding minister. Those not communing may come forward for a blessing, keeping your hands folded over your chest. For those unable to consume either wine or bread, communion is received fully in either element alone.

Holy Trinity's radical welcome is also an **invitation to baptism** and a deeper connection to community. If you are not baptized, please speak to one of the pastors to learn more about the process of adult baptism.





SIMEON'S SONG: On the Sundays after Epiphany we will be singing a paraphrase of the Song of Simeon to conclude communion. This canticle was a regular part of many historic Lutheran liturgies, and its place at the end of the service reflects gratitude for seeing the Lord's salvation in the eucharist, and departing in peace. Called the "Nunc Dimittis" in Latin, this biblical canticle from Luke 2 is also sung in Compline (Prayer at the Close of the Day) and sometimes at funerals, as it calls to mind Simeon who is able to die in peace having seen Jesus, the holy child and promised one.

Thursday, January 31 will be its last day of operation in serving food, clothing, and related items to the clients that rely on this site for assistance. Many of us who have volunteered at this site, over the years, have observed that it is fairly limited in being a welcoming location to the clients of the Lakeview Pantry-West. At the new location Holy Trinity volunteers will now serve on the fourth Tuesday of the month, starting in February. This will allow us who have served with Carrie McCormack for many years to serve with her at the Lakeview Pantry location at 3945 N. Sheridan Road. The time of volunteering remains the same from 5:30 to 8:30pm.

Upcoming Commemorations

January 21 + Agnes, martyr, died around 304

Agnes was a girl of about thirteen living in Rome. The details of her martyrdom are not clear, but she gave witness to her faith and was put to death as a result, most likely by the sword. The church has honored her as one of the chief martyrs of her time.

January 25 + Conversion of Paul

The week of prayer begun by the remembrance of Peter's confession now comes to an end as we recall the pivotal moment in the life of the other pillar of the early church, the apostle Paul. His encounter with the risen Christ turned him from persecutor of the followers of Christ to one of their leaders.

January 26 + Timothy, Titus, and Silas, missionaries

These three early Christian men were missionary companions of the apostle Paul. Timothy became bishop of Ephesus, Titus bishop of Crete, and Silas was imprisoned with Paul at Philippi until they were delivered by an earthquake.
